PARTNERING WITH THE SCHOOL PRINCIPAL

The success of a school council often rests with the partnership they form with the Principal. There are some Principals who are naturally enthusiastic and supportive of the council. On the other hand, there are some who are slower to form a comfortable working partnership with parent leaders.

Here are nine tips on how to help build a positive partnership with your school administrator.

1. Establish a good communication plan at the beginning of the school year. The Chair should ask to meet with the Principal at least one week before a council meeting. The Chair and Principal should use this



Principal.

- 2. While parent leaders play an important role in the school, it is important to remember that the Principal has the final responsibility for all operations in the school.
- 3. Running meetings effectively and respecting the time commitment for both parents and the principal will allow the council to accomplish a great deal. Getting bogged down in details can be frustrating. This can cause everyone to lose interest in the meeting. It is a good idea to identify what needs to be done. Once that is established, delegate to a sub-committee that can handle the issues at a later date or time.
- 4. Do not bring personal matters to council meetings. School council Chairs should make sure that no other members raise personal issues. Council meetings should be limited to school activities that affect all students in the school.
- 5. Developing an annual budget as a council, in conjunction with the Principal, will help the council move towards a common goal that aligns with everyone's priorities.


- 6. Ask the Principal what their priorities are and how the council might assist in achieving these goals.
- 7. Appreciate your Principal and thank them for their efforts.
- 8. Treat your Principal with respect. Remember that they have many responsibilities in running a school besides school council work. Understand they may not be able to respond immediately to your emails or needs put forth by the council.
- 9. Remember your Principal is a person, just like you. They will have good days and bad. Try to be compassionate and understand that there may be a better day to present new ideas or concerns.

I know that there are school council Chairs that feel like no matter what they do, they simply cannot build a positive relationship with their Principal. There could be many reasons that this is the case.

Some of these reasons may include:

- The Principal had a negative experience with a previous school council. This could be the reason the Principal now holds back from supporting the current council.
- There could be some very stressful situations at the school that require the Principal's attention. This can affect their relationship with council members.
- It could be that the there is a perceived "power struggle" between the parents and the Principal. It is to everyone's benefit to identify this problem immediately. Remember the goal is to have everyone work together effectively for the benefit of all the students in the school.
- It simply could be that the Principal does not recognize the value that parent leaders bring to the school. In this case, demonstrating how the council could work with them to support the students and the school community may be helpful. Starting with small things and working towards a plan that is a truly collaborative effort that benefits all.

Time to get back into the swing of things. Here are our suggestions for getting your parent council up and running this September.

September is the month that School Council elections typically take place. There are some schools who will wait until the last minute. This will force parent councils to schedule a meeting in early October. Regulation 612 requires elections to take place within 30 days of the start of the school year.

Rather than just simply holding council elections, existing councils in collaboration with the Principal

might consider holding an Annual General Meeting (find a sample Annual General Meeting agenda here: https://www.parentsengagedineducation.ca/media/docs/resources/annual-general-meeting-sample.pdf) featuring a speaker that is relevant to the school community. It is an excellent opportunity to attract more parents early in the school year. It is also excellent time to showcase the work the council accomplished the previous school year along with the goals for the upcoming year. Letting parents know what role they can play in making a difference in the school community may encourage new people to run for election to the school council.

THE ELECTION PROCEDURES OUTLINED IN REGULATION 612 REQUIRES;

"The principal of a school, shall, at least 14 days before the date of the election of parent members, on behalf of the school council, give written notice of the date, time and location of the election to every parent of a pupil who, on the date the notice is given, is enrolled in the school." C.Reg.612/00 s. 4(6)

This being the case, it is easier if the outgoing council establishes a date for elections prior to the closing of their business for the current year. The letter could be drafted and ready to go at the beginning of the new school year. Look at a sample Principal Annual General Meeting letter that I have put together (https://www.parentsengagedineducation.ca/media/docs/resources/principal-letter-for-agmelections.pdf). Having said that, it is often beneficial to wait a few weeks into the new school year so that you can engage new parents to join the council.

PROVIDE ADDITIONAL PARENT COUNCIL INFORMATION FOR PARENTS

Attaching information about the role of the school council and nomination forms to the notice sent out by the Principal will also assist in increasing interest for parents who may not be aware of the work of the council.

Following the school council elections, it is helpful to hold the first Inaugural Meeting of the council in order to elect the Executive Committee (Chair, Vice Chair or Co-Chair, Treasurer and Secretary). Before electing these roles provide all members information about the roles and responsibilities of each position. To assist Parents Engaged in Education has developed several resources which may make this process easier.

SET FUTURE MEETING DATES

The inaugural meeting would be the best time to establish school council meeting dates for the entire school year. This will allow the council chair or the Principal to communicate these dates to the school community.



12 BACK TO SCHOOL IDEAS FOR SOCIAL MEDIA TO

PROMOTE PARENT ENGAGEMENT

HAVING A GOOD SOCIAL MEDIA ACTION PLAN IN PLACE AT THE BEGINNING OF THE SCHOOL YEAR WILL HELP PROMOTE YOUR PARENT COUNCIL.

Social media is a great means of helping to build and promote your school community during back-to-school time. It helps your parent council to immediately interact with the school community right out of the gate. This "real time" partnership allows your school council to feel easily accessible and personable. The trick to using socials channels effectively is not to repeatedly appeal and petition parents to get involved. Showcase what is wonderful about your school community and make it more appealing so that they want to be involved.

With social media nowadays, school councils need to take advantage of telling parents in your community who you are and what your mandates are for this year. Show them what you have accomplished, offer helpful information, ask them for feedback and opinions. But most importantly provide them with a sense that they belong.

Here is an action plan that you can start to look over in the summer for the first weeks of school. Some of these ideas will work best on different social media platforms. But with a little thought, can be modified to fit your schools most popular social media channel.

THE PLAN

- 1. Introduce yourself! Post a photo of your parent council on social media. Let your school community put faces to the people that make your parent council. Ask people to like the post to start generating engagement. Ask a series of questions. Some good questions to ask are:
 - What are you most looking forward to this school year?
 - What parent council events are you most looking forward to?
 - If there is one item parent council could help with what would it be?
- 2. Hand over all the info. Provide your school community with links to all the information they will need throughout the school year,

important dates and events, your upcoming parent council meeting dates and any important contact information they may need. Provide a checklist of items so that parents can easily find all the information they need. Bonus points if you can provide a visual checklist in your social media post.

- 3. Partner up with your school's principal. Every school year there are a lot of new people who join your school community. If your principal is willing, try and conduct a short interview with them so that new parents can get to know them and make them feel more "real". Some great questions to ask are simple. What is your favorite food, favorite move, and favorite time of the year?
- 4. Hype up your school's curriculum night. In partnership with the school announce when your school's curriculum or meet the teacher night will be. Highlight the fact that your parent council will be there at the event and where you can be found to ask and answer any questions the school community may have.
- 5. Show your school spirit! Post a photo of your school building, school grounds or even the school mascot. Ask your community for feedback with questions like "What do you like most about our school? What would you change if anything?" Make sure to like people's comments and try responding to them directly. Make sure to share feed back with the school principal and staff.
- 6. Publish reminders about important back-to-school information. Are there any changes to busing or drop-off procedures? Is there anything happening at the school before the official first day? Some of this information will come from the school, however hearing it from your parent council too won't hurt.
- 7. Document the first day/week of school. Take a series of photos throughout the first day/

- week and create a photo album or slide show on Facebook. (Remember to OK this with the school and get permission to use photos of the students.)
- 8. Post helpful resources for families on transitioning back to school or on parenting issues in general. These resources show that your council is knowledgeable and ready to help. You can find many of those resources on the Parents Engaged in Education website.
- 9. Post early thank you notes. This is a good time to thank volunteers and staff members who have come in early and have prepared the school for the beginning of the year. Don't forget to include photos if possible.
- 10. Take a poll. Ask your school community to vote for some of their favorite school lunches. Or ask your school community to vote for their favorite parent council event. Simply post a question on your Facebook page, post a poll on Twitter or use a free poll such as SurveyMonkey.
- 11. Promote your first meeting. Try to think outside the box. Here is your chance to get innovative and promote your first council meeting. Post a silly picture or provide hints as to what fun things to expect at your first meeting. If available don't forget to highlight the fact that child minding is available!
- 12. Ask for input/feedback. Give your school community a chance to ask questions and provide feedback so that they feel more invested. If your parent council runs a weekly or monthly newsletter, ask your community to come up with a new name for the newsletter this school year. Once you have gathered some choices for a new name ask your community to yote for their favorite.

Putting this action plan in place and executing it effectively will have your parent council saying, don't you love it when a plan comes together.

ZOOM TIPS

FOR YOUR SCHOOL COUNCIL MEETING

Chances are you have been using Zoom for your online school council meetings or even to meet with family and friends during this pandemic. Whether you are new to videoconferencing or have been doing it for months now, there's always room for making your virtual meetings smoother and more enjoyable.

If you haven't done a virtual meeting yet via Zoom, it is always a good idea to test it out with a friend in order to get comfortable with setting up a meeting and running it.

When you first go live, take your time and allow a few minutes for people to join you. People sometimes need a few moments to tune in. I know I always forget to click on the connect to computer audio button. I always try to play some background music when starting my meeting to remove some of the awkwardness.

At the start of the meeting, introduce yourself and let viewers know they can post questions in the comments or chat. You might say something like, "Feel free to ask your questions, and we'll get to them at the end."

SET A CO-HOST OR MODERATOR.

Setting a co-host and/or moderator will allow someone else to help you manage the meeting, including screen sharing and pausing for chat comments and questions.

REMEMBER TO BE CONVERSATIONAL AND RELAXED.

To the best of your ability, behave as you would at a normal school council meeting. You don't want to sound stiff or scripted. People will respond better to your natural self.

INTERACT WITH ATTENDEES.

At different times throughout the meeting, reintroduce yourself and welcome people who have just joined you.

BREAK THE ICE.

Just as at in-person meetings, starting your meeting with a tongue-in-cheek or funny question can help get the conversation flowing. For ideas on virtual icebreakers visit our 5 Virtual Ice Breakers for Parent Council Meetings blog.

DURING YOUR Q&A SESSION,

remember to repeat questions to your audience and don't forget to mention who the question came from.

ASK EVERYONE TO MUTE THEMSELVES

to cut down on background noise. Also, remember to set microphones to mute as a default when setting up your meeting.

WITH SECURITY CONCERNS, MAKE SURE YOUR MEETING IS PASSWORD-PROTECTED

so only invited participants can get in.

DON'T WORRY IF SOMETHING UNEXPECTED HAPPENS.

If one of your kids walks in (there's a lot of that happening these days), just roll with it. Remember that you're broadcasting to other parents; they'll understand! Chances are the same thing will happen to them.

BECAUSE PEOPLE ARE REMOTE, BUMP UP YOUR FRIENDLINESS A NOTCH

to compensate for not being there in person.

SOME PARENTS ATTENDING THE MEETING MIGHT NOT WANT TO BE ON CAMERA.

That's OK! You can help them participate by suggesting that they turn off their cameras, if they want to.

The following are some keyboard shortcuts that allow you to navigate the Zoom settings without having to use your mouse.



SHORTCUTS FOR WINDOWS

- Ctrl+Alt+Shift: Move focus to Zoom's meeting controls
- PageUp: View previous 25 video stream in gallery view
- PageDown: View next 25 video stream in gallery view
- Alt+F1: Switch to active speaker view in video meeting
- Alt+F2: Switch to gallery video view in video meeting
- Alt+V: Start/stop video
- Alt+A: Mute/unmute audio
- Alt+M: Mute/unmute audio for everyone except host Note: For the meeting host only
- Alt+S: Launch share screen window and stop screen share Note: Will only work when meeting control toolbar has focus
- Alt+Shift+S: Start/stop new screen share
 Note: Will only work when meeting control toolbar has focus
- · Alt+Y: Raise/lower hand

SHORTCUTS FOR MACS

- Command(x)+Shift+A: Mute/unmute audio
- Command(%)+Control+M: Mute audio for everyone except the host (only available to the host)
- Command(%)+Control+U: Unmute audio for everyone except host (only available to the host)
- Command(x)+Shift+V: Start/stop video
- Command(%)+Shift+S: Start/stop screen share
- **Ctrl+P:** View previous 25 participants in gallery view
- **Ctrl+N**: View next 25 participants in gallery view
- Option+Y: Raise hand/lower hand
- Command(%)+Shift+F: Enter or exit full screen
- Ctrl+Option+Command+H: Show/hide meeting controls

TO GOVERN ONTARIO'S TEACHING PROFESSION

The Ontario College of Teachers exists to support and safeguard the well-being and interests of the province's students. It does so through the regulation of Ontario's more than 232,000 teachers.

The College sets standards of practice and ethical standards, conducts disciplinary hearings, and accredits teacher education programs. The College is Canada's largest self-regulatory body.

WHY THIS MATTERS TO ONTARIO'S STUDENTS

Much like accounting, nursing and engineering, teaching is a regulated profession. Only licensed professionals – Ontario Certified Teachers (OCTs) – can teach in the province's publicly funded elementary and secondary schools. In Ontario, there are more than two million students attending these schools. The College's governing Council and committees ensure the College meets its mandate of protecting these students and ensuring their well-being.

MAKE A DIFFERENCE WHILE GROWING YOUR PROFESSIONAL EXPERTISE

Similar to a board of directors in public and private organizations, members of the College's governing Council, committees and rosters will help it fulfill its mandate of protecting the public interest.

You'll have an opportunity to shape education while working alongside qualified and dedicated professionals, reflecting Ontario's diversity. At the same time, you'll be able to apply and develop your

own professional experience and knowledge in regulation and education.

BENEFITS OF SERVING

With more than 100 positions available in diverse roles, the College is encouraging you to *apply online* and serve on any of the following parts of governance:

- Council ensures that policies are established in accordance with the College's objects as set out in the Ontario College of Teachers Act. Council members will also serve on the following subcommittees: Audit and Finance, Human Resources, and Selection and Nominating.
- Committees, which perform the regulatory and statutory work of the College. Some committees, such as Accreditation and Discipline, require additional time to serve on adjudicative panels. Statutory committee chairs and vice-chairs also serve on the Adjudicative Body of Chairs.
- Rosters, whose members participate on panels to decide on matters on behalf of a committee.

Members of the public will receive a daily per diem from the College, while OCTs who are employed in public education must be released by their employers to perform the work of the College. In turn, the College reimburses employers for the hiring of temporary replacement teachers.

The application process is open until September 30, 2021. Individuals will assume their new roles effective January 1, 2022 for two-year terms.
